

April, 2016 District Manager's Report

FDNY (See Stats)

Reported: Candle fires are on the rise, while other causes for home fires have decreased, the percentage caused by candles has tripled in the past ten years. More than 33% of candle fires occurred when the candles were left unattended or abandoned. Roughly 25% of the fires occurred because something combustible such as curtains or paper was too close to the flame. Half the people killed by candle fires in the home were younger than 20, with most of the victims between the ages of 5 and 9.

Subway crime overall on the rise citywide, the following Safety Tips were discussed:

- Use only subway entrances marked by a green indicator, where there is a clerk present 24hrs a day;
- Sit in the center of the car, away from the door, to avoid a purse, smart phone (electronics), or chain snatching;
- Cover Jewelry; turn stone rings toward the palm side of the your hand;
- Stay awake and aware and exit with the crowd;
- Be aware of your wallet/purse to avoid a pickpocket;
- Ride in the conductor's car during off-peak hours

Patrol Borough Manhattan North (See Stats):

Reported Grand Larceny and Scams are on the rise, mostly with seniors and the IRS; warned IRS NEVER makes calls regarding Taxes.

New York City residents attending school between the ages of 10 and 16 are eligible to participate in the Summer Youth Police Academy – 2016. The 2016 Youth Police Academy is a six (6) week program that will hold sessions five (5) days a week. Students selected to participate will attend classroom sessions with lectures, role-plays and demonstrations by police officers in the areas of law, behavior science, drug prevention, gang resistance, and life skills.

Field trips are also part of the curriculum. The academy will begin on Tuesday, July 5th and end on Friday, August 12th 2016. (See attached Flyer)

Morningside Heights:

IDNYC is the new free identification card for all NYC residents in need of identification, starting Wednesday, February 17th – March 11th, 2016 the Morningside Heights Branch will offer services to obtain an IDNYC card. Recently the city announced that the IDNYC program will provide free one-year memberships to seven additional cultural institutions in 2016, including the MoMA, the Metropolitan Opera and the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum. The venues join 33 museums, art spaces and other locations that are currently offered as an incentive for getting the card (**No appointments are necessary**).

ConEdison:

Reported work on Broadway (bet. 151st – 153rd Sts) both sides is still ongoing and will conclude June-2016.

Agency Reports and Updates:

DOT:

Lyle Blackwood reported: NYC Dot will implement safety improvements along Broadway between W. 135th St. and W. 155th Street:

- Reconfigure lanes to better organize traffic
- Shorten 36 pedestrians crossings
- Create more pedestrian space and better align cross walks with medians

- Increase vehicle and pedestrian safety by eliminating left turns at select locations

Implementation (Work) will begin early April – 2016

DOB:

Reported: Buildings Commissioner Rick Chandler announced that the Department is launching a new initiative to inspect all gas plumbing jobs prior to allowing service to be turned on. The program will begin this summer and will be performed by 22 newly-hired plumbing inspectors who will focus on gas safety. The new inspection policy follows a new partnership between DOB and the City's utility companies in which all parties immediately notify one another of suspected illegal gas work or unsafe conditions.

Currently, licensed master plumbers are permitted to certify that their own gas plumbing work is code-compliant. Under the Department's new policy, an inspector will follow up to ensure that gas connections have been properly installed and tested and are safe for service. This new initiative will initially be implemented in Manhattan this summer, and expand Citywide in 2017. DOB is rolling out the new program in Manhattan because the borough has the oldest gas infrastructure and highest population density in the City.

Last year, the Department of Buildings and Con Edison partnered to share inspection data immediately after illegal or unsafe gas plumbing conditions were found. This initiative ensures that gas service remains suspended until all unsafe conditions are resolved. This partnership resulted in more than a 400% increase in referral-based inspections of unsafe gas plumbing conditions in 2015. Building upon the success of this initiative, the Department began coordinating with National Grid earlier this year to implement a similar data-sharing partnership.

HRA:

Reported: Mayor Bill de Blasio recently announced a comprehensive plan to ensure homeless services are delivered as efficiently and effectively as possible with a focus on both preventing vulnerable New Yorkers from becoming homeless and rehousing individuals and families in shelter into permanent housing. The plan is the result of the 90-day review of homeless services ordered by the Mayor and incorporates and builds on the many reforms that were announced during the review period. The first part of the plan, full implementation of the HOME-STAT outreach program for street homeless, was announced last week. The plan also includes measures to improve conditions and safety in shelters.

To ensure all resources are focused on prevention and rehousing:

- The City will implement an integrated management structure with both the Human Resources Administration (HRA) and the Department of Homeless Services (DHS) reporting to a single Commissioner of Social Services (DSS), current DSS/HRA Commissioner Steven Banks.
- Prevention and rehousing operations at DHS will be consolidated with groups that perform the same function at HRA. DHS's Homebase prevention unit will join HRA's Homelessness Prevention Administration.

A unified HRA management structure based on the veterans move out initiative will focus on finding permanent housing for shelter residents.

- DHS will focus on managing and improving shelter operations, including developing new types of shelters.
- The two agencies will share administrative support services resulting in substantial savings.
- To advance accountability for preventing and alleviating homelessness across multiple City agencies, the City will create an Interagency Homelessness Accountability Council reporting to the Deputy Mayor for Health and Human Services Herminia Palacio.

There are four key elements to the new plan – prevention, rehousing, street homelessness outreach and improving shelter conditions – and a total of 46 individual systemic reforms. As a result of the proposed reforms, there will be administrative and programmatic savings estimated at \$38 million by eliminating duplicative administrative operations and streamlining management, which will offset new program costs of \$66 million that will be presented in the Executive Budget.

Reported SNAP on demand is implementing a pilot program in Washington Heights at 4055 10th Avenue, Lower Level, NYC 10034. The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program - SNAP (formerly known as “food stamps”) provides food assistance for nearly 1.8 million low-income New Yorkers including families, the elderly and the disabled. The program helps families and individuals supplement the cost of their diet with nutritious foods.

*Summons warrants do not apply to felonies and penal law misdemeanors.

Urban Pathways (up): Has been in existence since 1975, and has worked to engage the most vulnerable New Yorkers – homeless and at-risk adults – and provide them with “a way home”. From outreach, to a drop-in center, to safe havens, to supportive housing, Urban Pathways’

programs are designed to provide assistance to all homeless adults, especially those who have previously tried and failed to remain in a shelter or housing.

Urban Pathways offers a variety of on-site services including case management, rehabilitation and recovery programs, and access to medical, mental health and substance abuse services, meals, clothing, showers, crisis intervention, legal assistance, vocational training, financial counseling, and housing referrals.

As the temperatures drops and further compromises the well-being of homeless New Yorkers Urban Pathways provides temporary housing facilities and rehabilitation services for homeless individuals who have been diagnosed with serious and persistent mental illness, and have not successfully engaged in conventional housing or outpatient treatment. 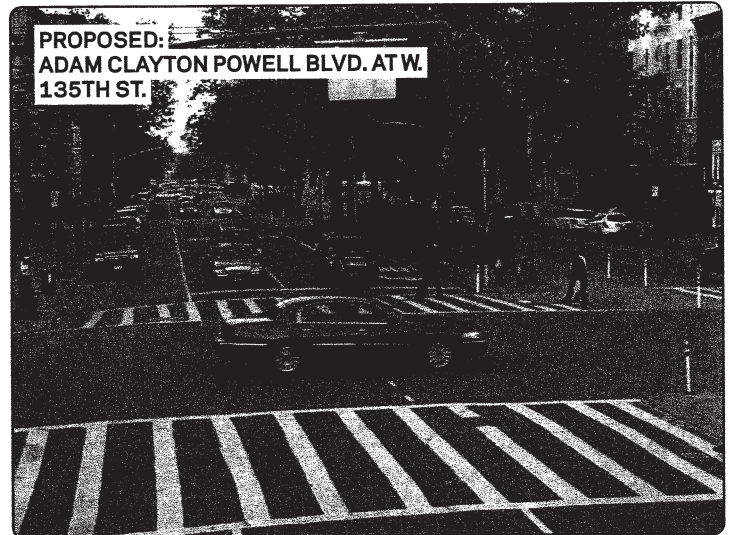
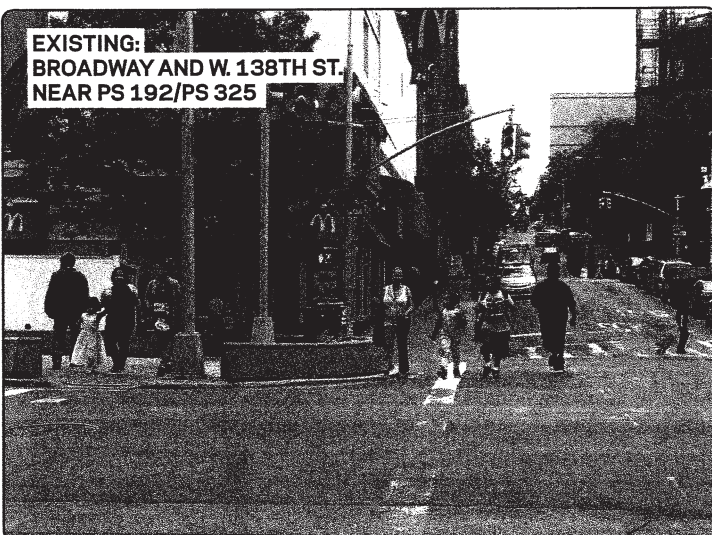
