Manhattan DA's Office Reported on:

394-Count Indictment against Identity Theft Ring, five (5) individuals were charged with fraudulently purchasing Apple electronics and gift cards, reports state a dental receptionist allegedly stole personal identifying information for more than 250 patients. Following a two-and-a-half-year long investigation by the Manhattan DA's Cybercrime and Identity Theft Bureau, the defendants were charged in a 394-count indictment in New York State Supreme Court with Grand Larceny in the Second, Third, and Fourth Degrees.

February is Teen Domestic Violence Month: National Domestic Violence Hotline - Dating Abuse Helpline. The Helpline offers real-time, one-on-one support from peer advocates who are trained young leaders to offer support, information and advocacy to those involved in dating abuse relationships as well as concerned friends, parents, teacher, clergy, law enforcement and service providers.

The New York County District Attorney's **High School Internship Program** is a rigorous six-week internship that provides students with an insider's view of the **criminal justice system**. For 27 years, the program's interns have represented a variety of public, private and parochial schools from the diverse communities of Manhattan. We are currently accepting applications from bright and promising students who are interested in serving their communities. Interns are paid a \$150 weekly stipend. Every intern is assigned to a unit within the office and helps Assistant District Attorneys and other staff members with their work. Interns also attend **presentations and trips** and participate in a **mock trial competition**.

Emergency Snow Laborers to Clear Snow and Ice after Major Winter Storms:

New York City Sanitation Commissioner Kathryn Garcia announced that recruitment has begun for emergency snow laborers for the upcoming snow season. Snow laborers are per diem workers who are called upon to remove snow and ice citywide from bus stops, crosswalks, fire hydrants and step streets in the City after heavy snowfalls

Individuals interested in registering with DSNY can do so at their local district garage weekdays between 7 a.m. and 3 p.m. The list of garage locations can be found at www.nyc.gov/sanitation. The pay rate begins at \$12 per hour, and increases to \$18 after the first 40 hours in the week.

Applicants must be at least 18 years of age, be eligible to work in the United States, and capable of performing heavy physical labor. All applicants must bring

- Two small photos (1 ½ square)
- Original and copy of two forms of identification
- Social Security card

This year, individuals may also register at select Department of Transportation locations. The offices will be open Monday through Friday, from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. and require the same photographs and identification.

Residential Organic Collection Program: The NYC Department of Sanitation collects yard waste, food scraps, and food-soiled paper every week from pilot area homes. Residents outside the pilot areas can still compost their food waste at a neighborhood food waste drop-off site.

How to Participate in Organics Collection: Starter kits will be delivered to households in pilot area. The kit includes the brown organics bin and a small kitchen container, along with detailed program information.

One and two family homes receive 13-gallon bins; buildings with 3 to 9 units receive 21 gallon bins. Apartment buildings with 10 or more units must apply to participate at <http://www.nyc.gov/html/nycwasteless/html/contact/enrollmentform.shtml>, since logistics are different.

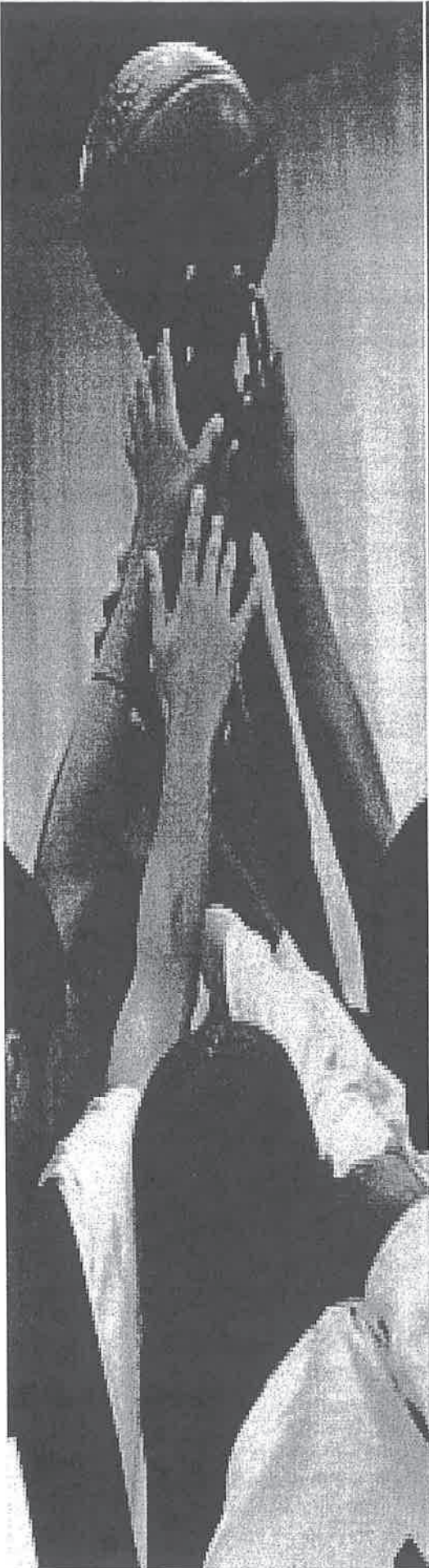

Dear Commissioners Basset, Lloyd, Garcia, Harvey, and Martens:

Thank you for your recent interagency efforts to eradicate Community Board 9's (CB9) mosquito infestation, including filling potholes and larviciding at Riverbank State Park. Despite these endeavors, the mosquito problem in CB9 persists, and will continue until further structural and drainage issues are addressed.

Standing water is the primary driver of the mosquito infestation. Our staffs have identified four structural and drainage issues that lead to standing water:

- The six-lane Henry Hudson Parkway between 135th and 143rd streets continues to experience a chronic drainage problem.
- A ponding area that exists around a nearby salt shed must be filled or retrofitted with drainage conduit pipes.
- Potholes on the West 145th street entrance to Riverside State Park must be filled or covered.
- Pipe infrastructure around Riverbank State Park is corroded, thus irrigating nearby grounds.


There has been some confusion regarding jurisdictional matters surrounding this problem. The New York State Parks Department contends that these issues are the responsibility of New York City Department of Environmental Protection pursuant to a departmental Memorandum of Understanding. Regardless of which Department is ultimately responsible, coordinated action must be taken to resolve what has become an out of control situation.

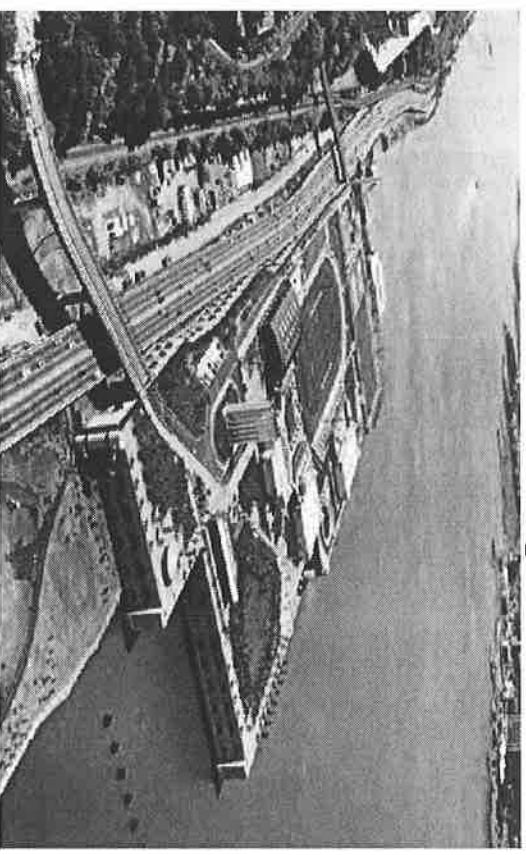

North River WWTP Existing Plant Overview



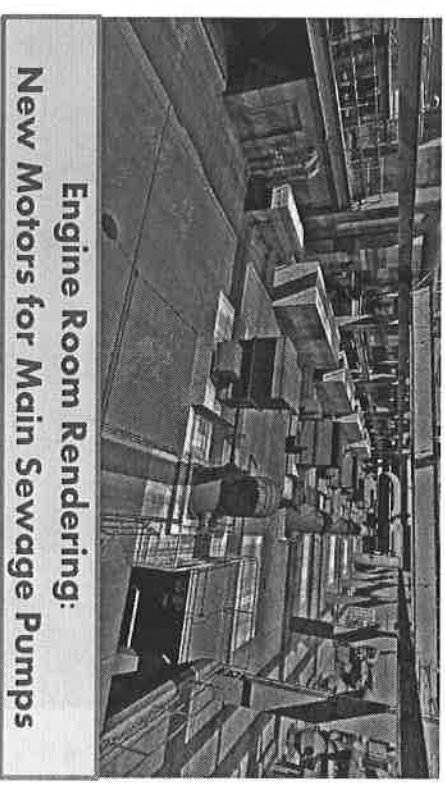
- ❖ Existing primary and secondary treatment facility serving 550,000 customers on Manhattan's west side
- ❖ The 10 existing engines used to power process pumps and blowers are nearing the end of their useful life requiring major overhaul or replacement
- ❖ Sludge from treatment processes are stabilized in digesters to generate biogas for use as fuel for the WWTP engines rather than flaring



North River WWTP Cogeneration Project Overview

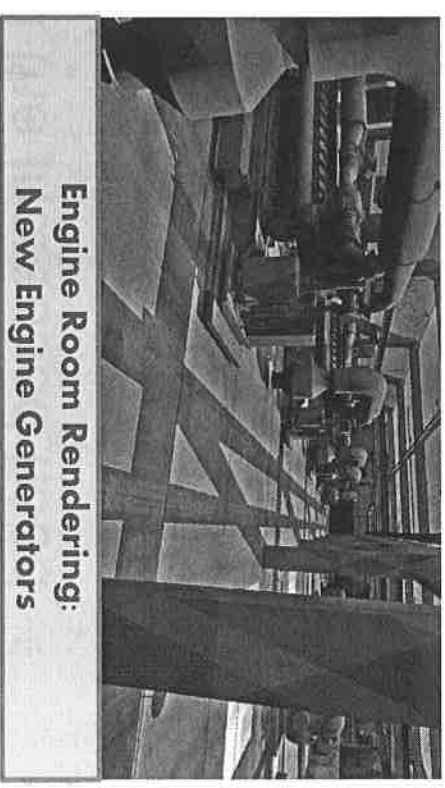


- ❖ Replace 10 existing pump and blower engines with 5 new dual fuel (natural gas and digester gas) cogeneration engines and electric motors
- ❖ New engines reduce emissions, further controlled with oxidation catalyst
- ❖ Improve Digester efficiency by installing new equipment
- ❖ Use digester gas as renewable fuel to power the engines
- ❖ Modifications and upgrades to the WWTP electrical distribution system



Project Status

- ❖ Title V Air Permit Modification was approved in November 2014 by EPA and DEC.
- ❖ Detailed Design is complete for four advanced construction contracts, first contract received bids in December 2014.
- ❖ Detailed Design is 60% complete for the Main Contract.
- ❖ The Riverbank State Park Electrical Substation design is still in the preliminary design stage.
- ❖ Coordination with Public Design Commission for Preliminary Review.

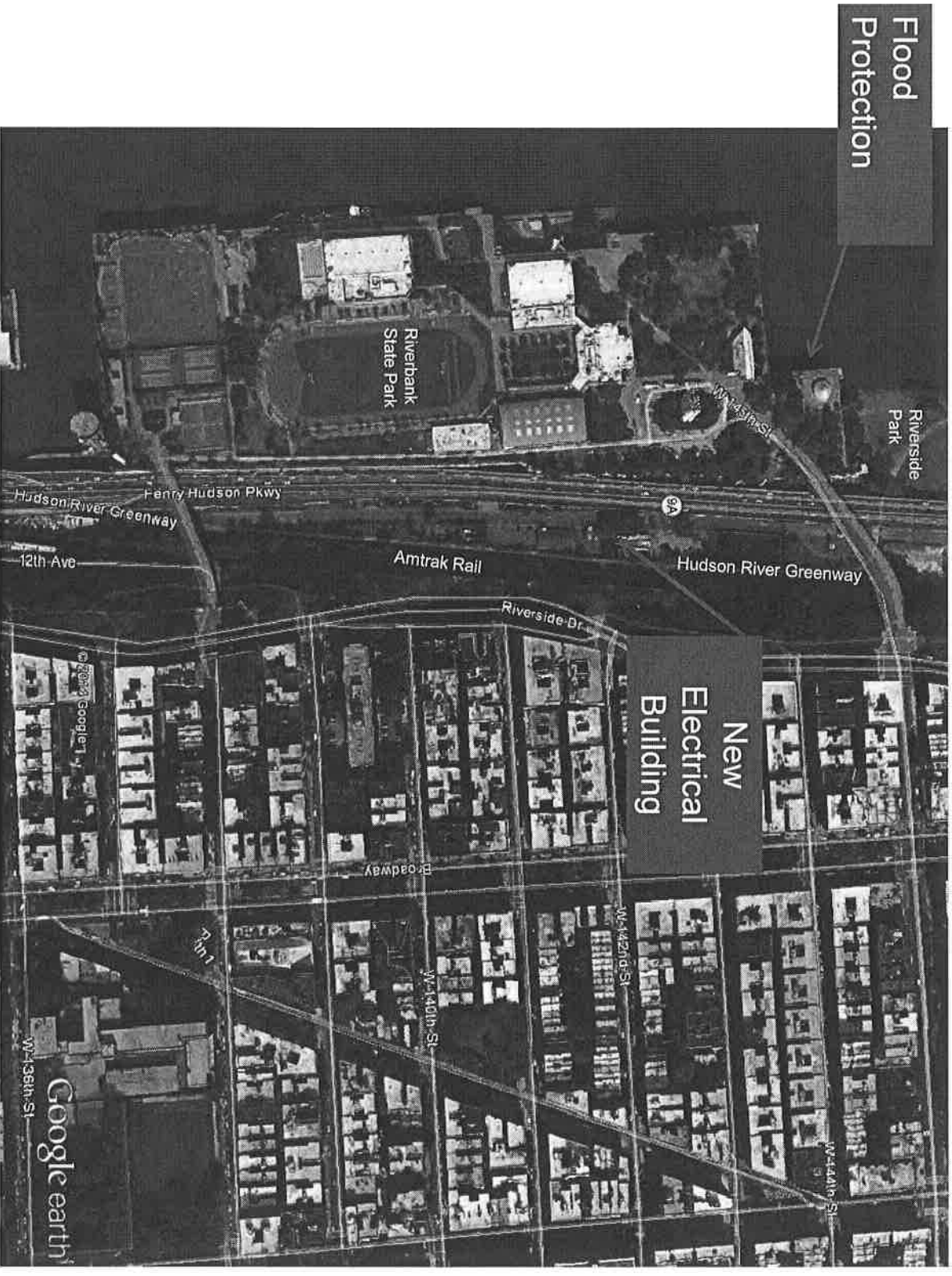


Construction Overview



- ❖ Construction occurring mainly indoors in existing engine room.
- ❖ Outdoor construction related to providing separate electrical feed to Riverbank State Park to provide reliable power.
- ❖ Construction within the plant that will be visible from Riverside Park includes the raising of seven openings in the exterior of the structure to withstand the increased flood levels published by FEMA.

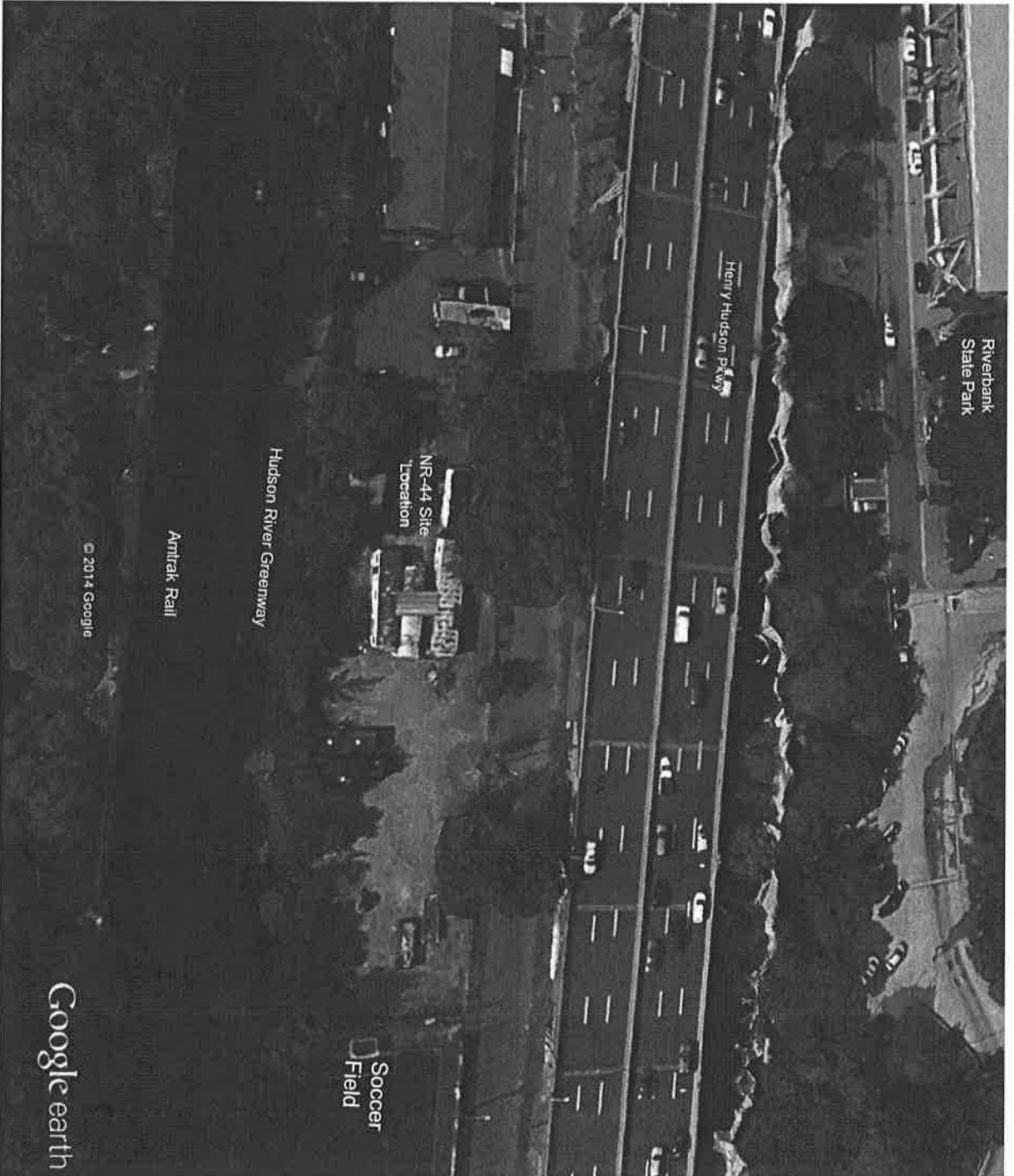


Proposed Riverbank State Park Electrical Building

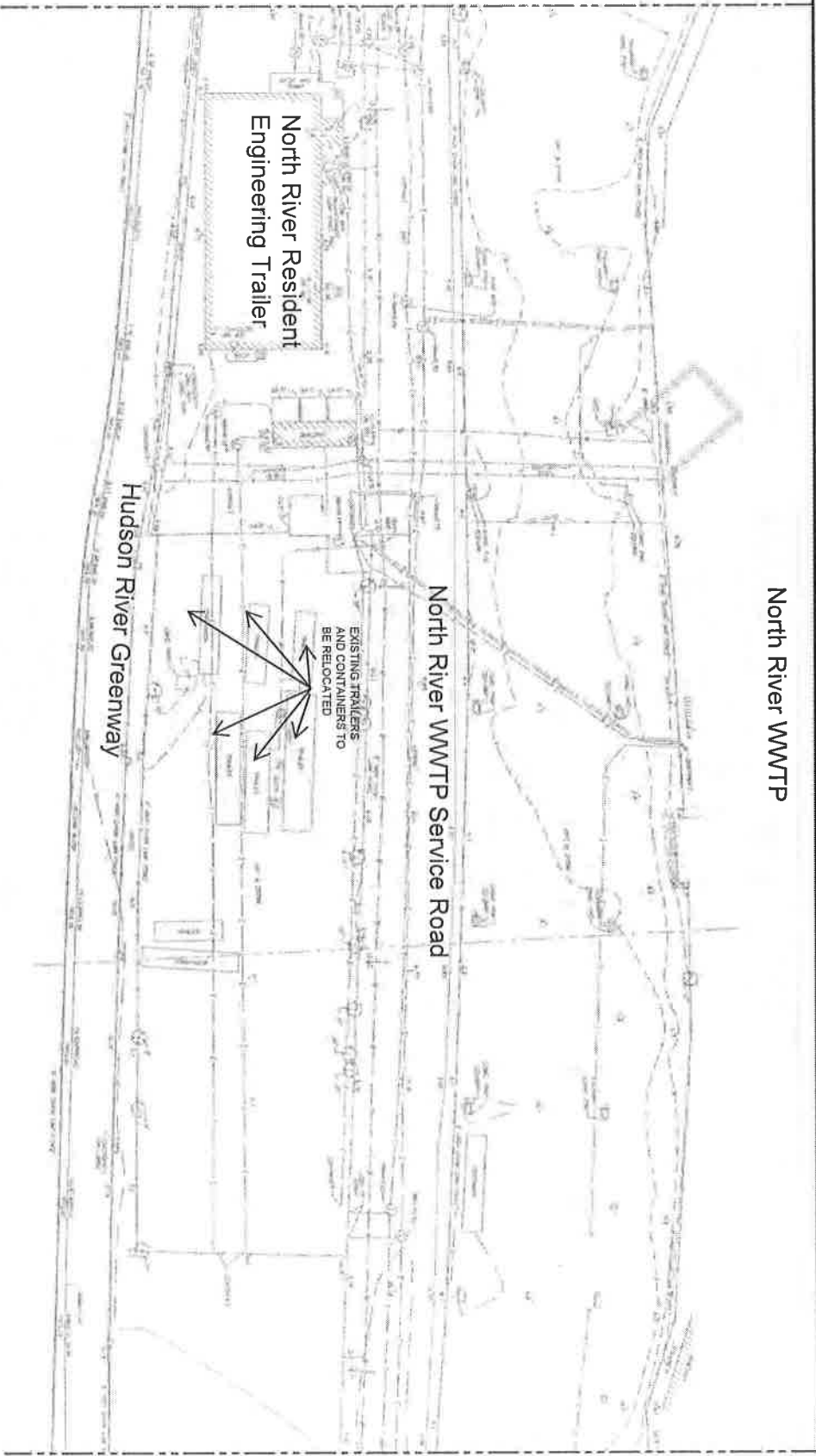
Electrical Substation Building

 - Increased electrical reliability for the Park.
 - Elimination of power outages due to WWTP operations.

- ❖ New Park Electrical Building will be constructed within the existing DEP Contractor Staging Area.
- ❖ Will be constructed above the 100 year flood elevation plus an additional 32 inches.
- ❖ Existing DEP abandoned electrical substation from the WWTP construction will be demolished.
- ❖ Buried conduit routing alternatives still being evaluated.

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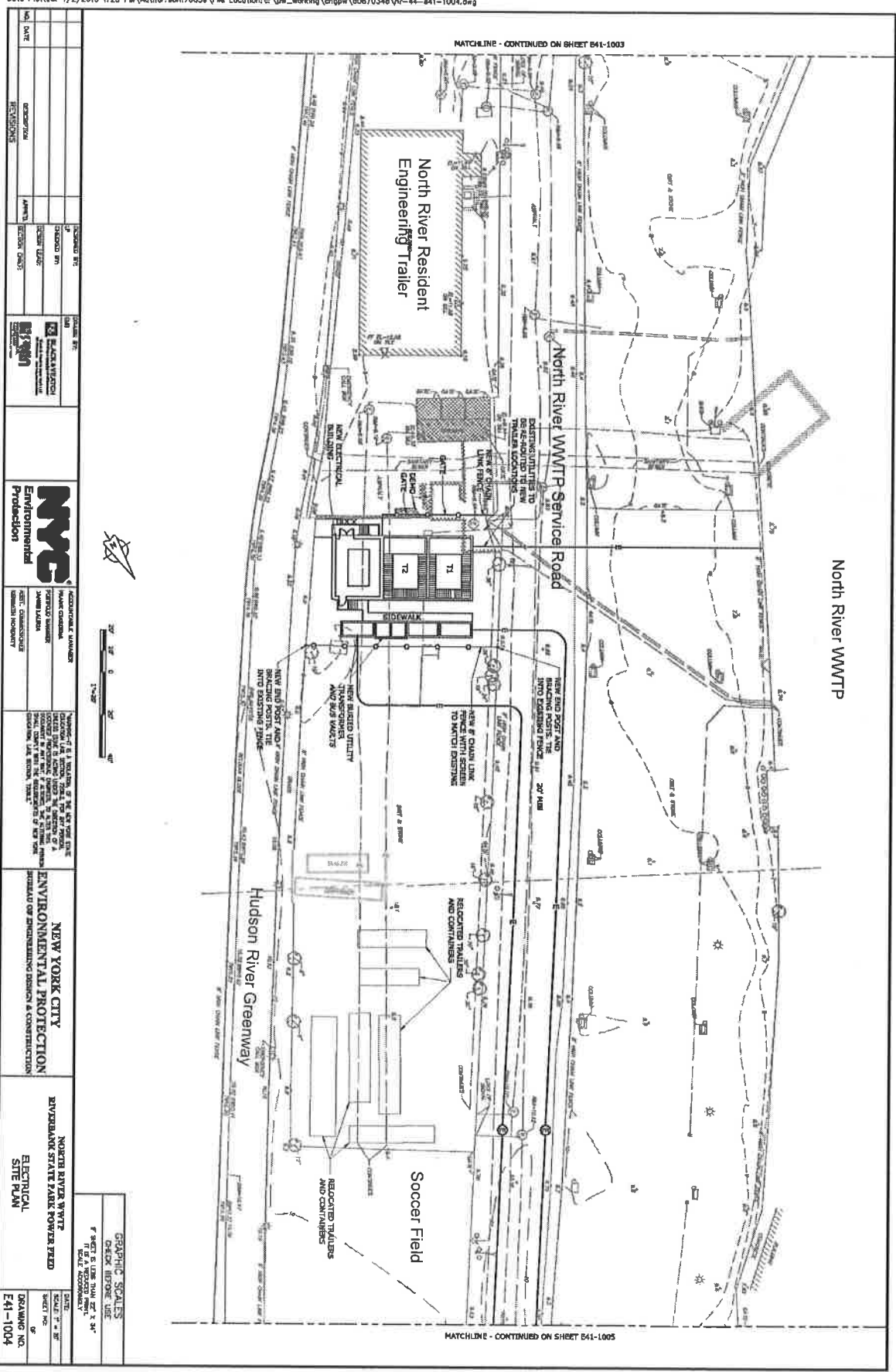

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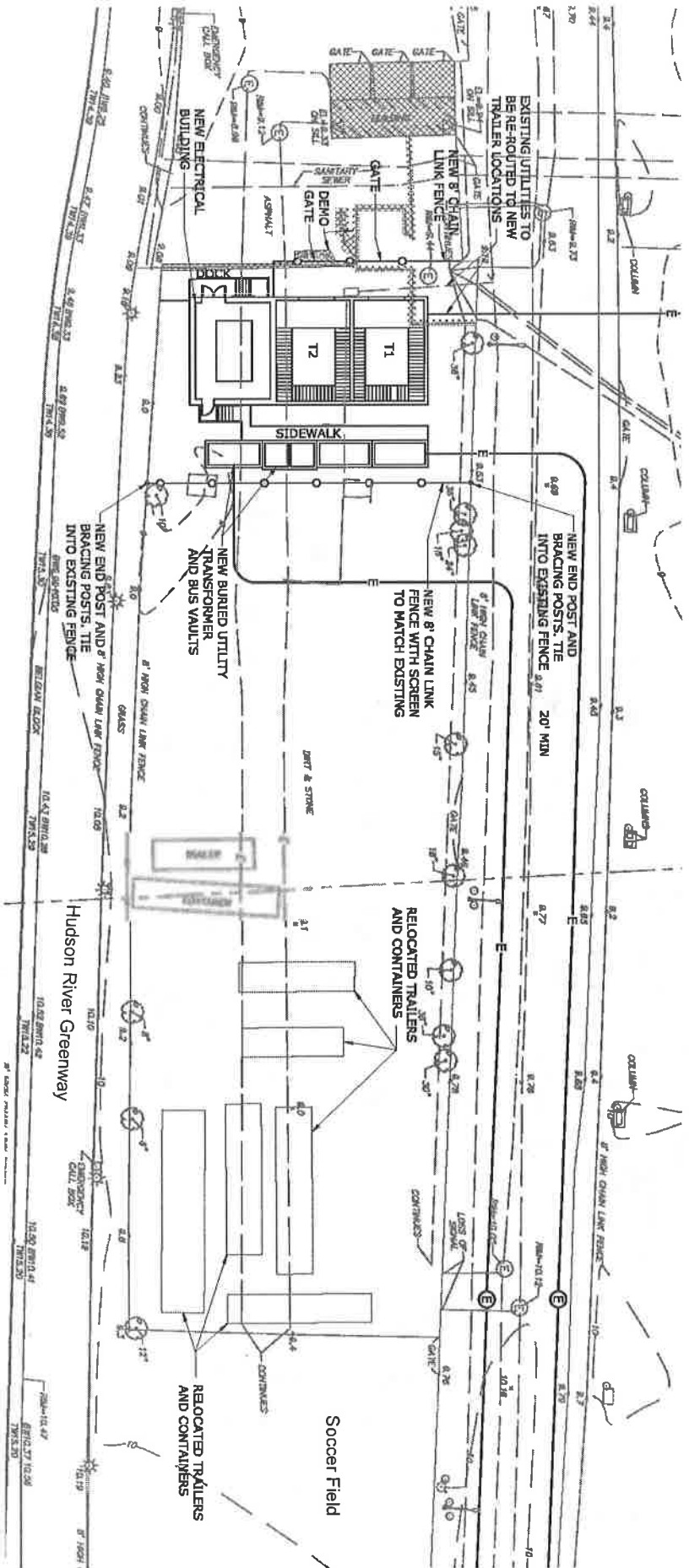
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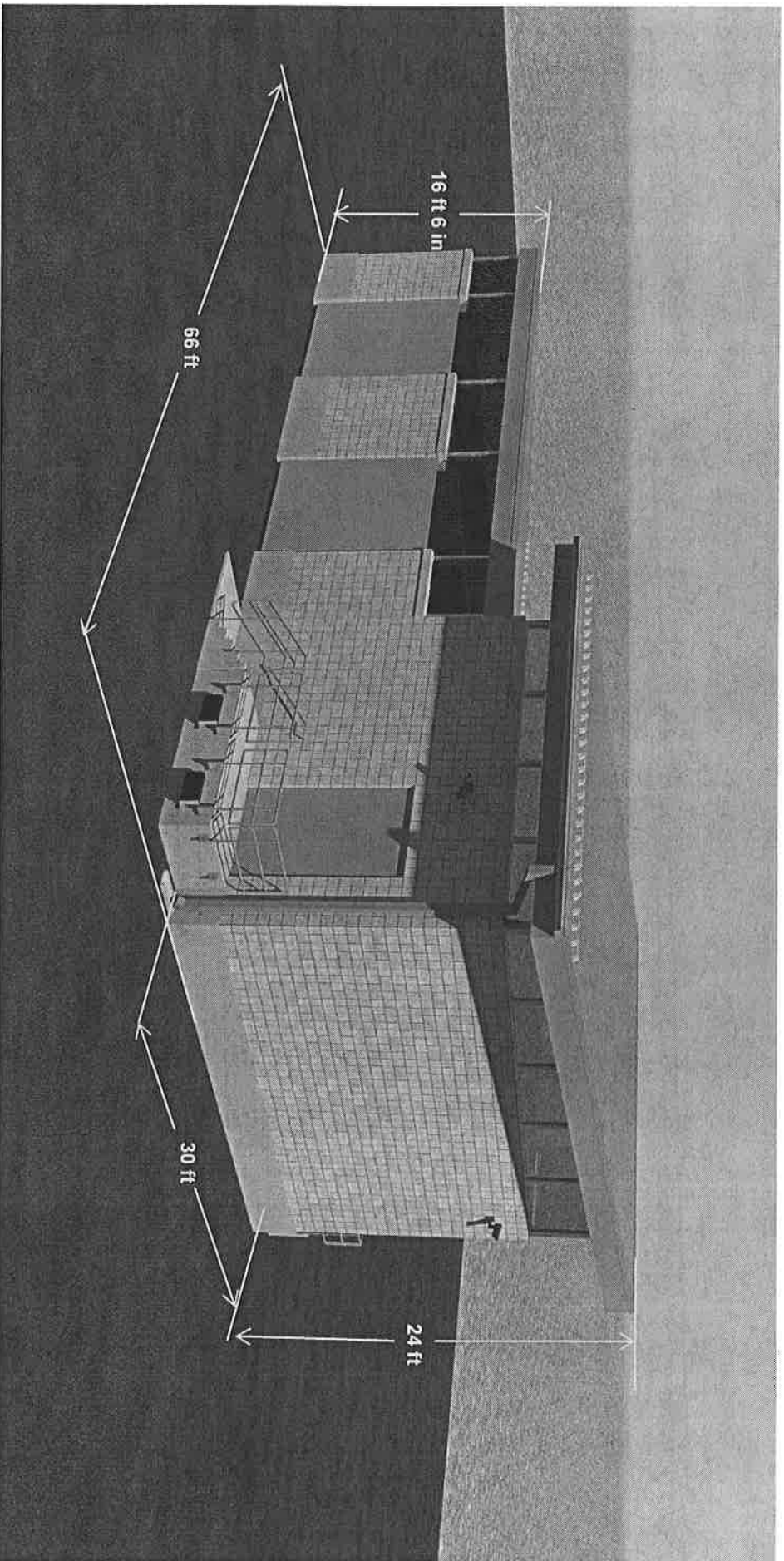

Site Plan - Close-up View

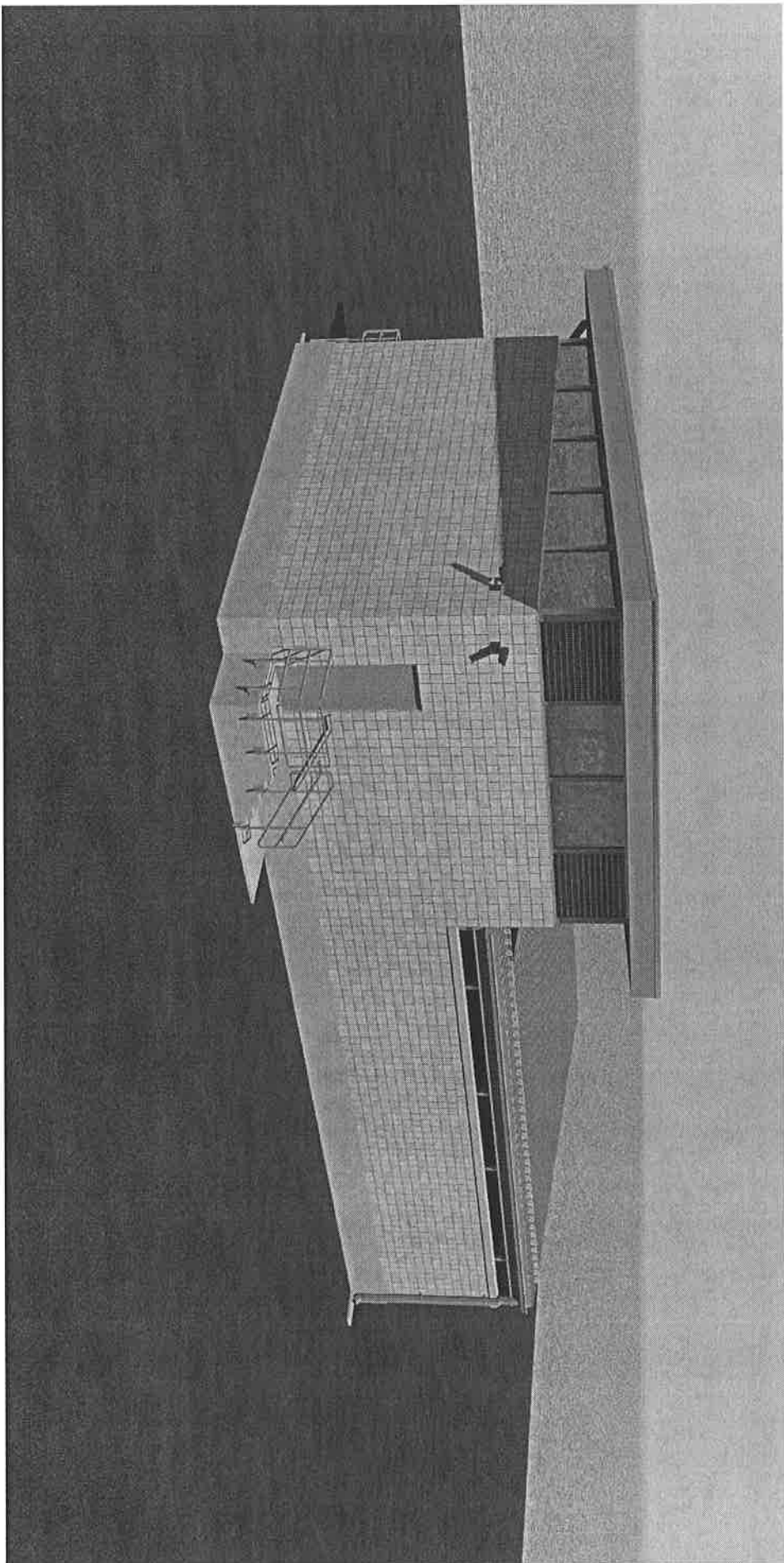


Electrical Building Rendering

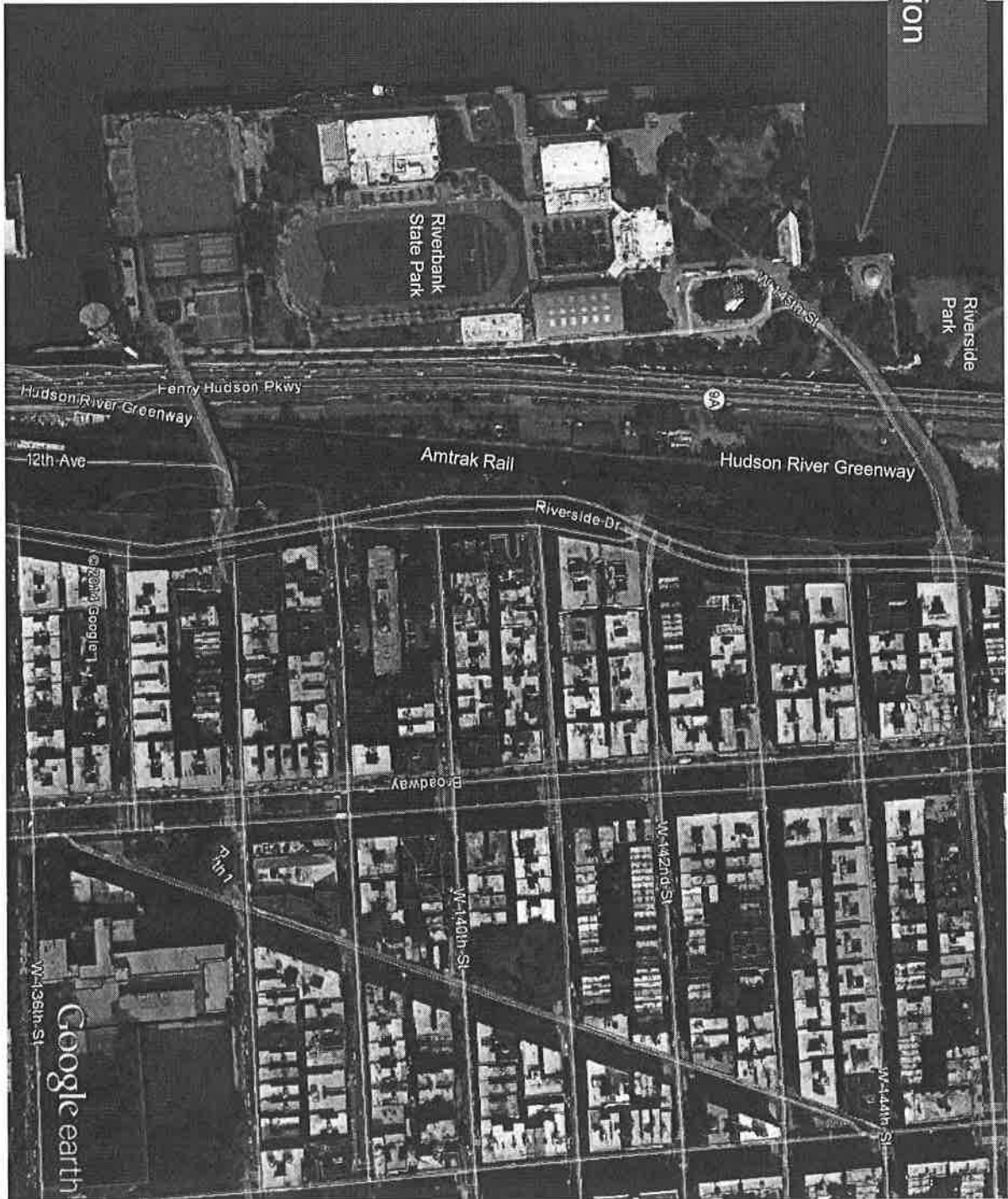

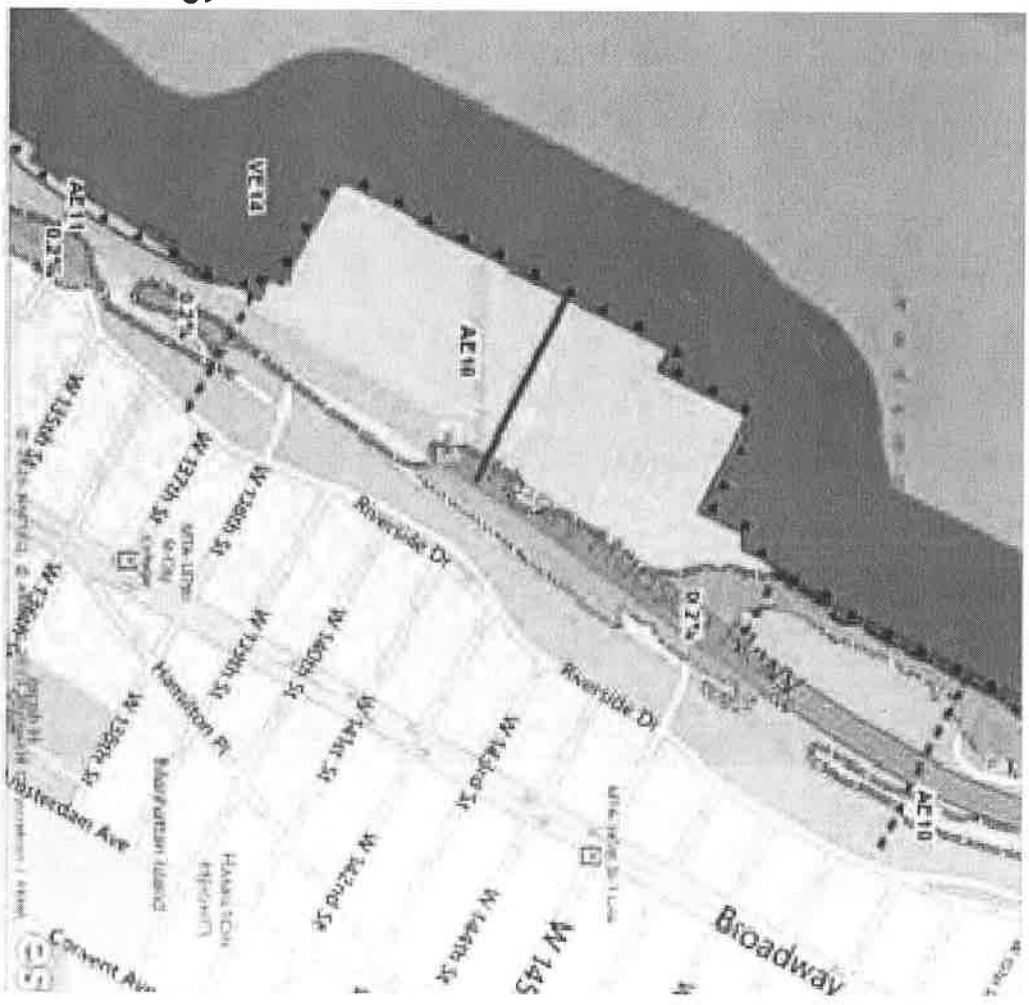

New FEMA Flood Maps



The revised FEMA maps that were published following Hurricane Sandy show all of the West facing walls and some of the North and South Walls of the North River WWTP subject to significant wave action with a design wave crest at Elevation 14 (Red Zone). DEP Guidance Documents for Critical Facilities requires protection to a flood level 32-inches higher than FEMA, or Elevation 16.6.

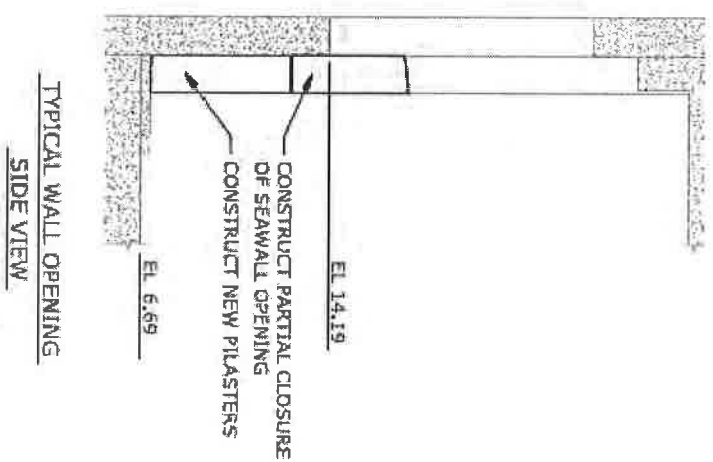
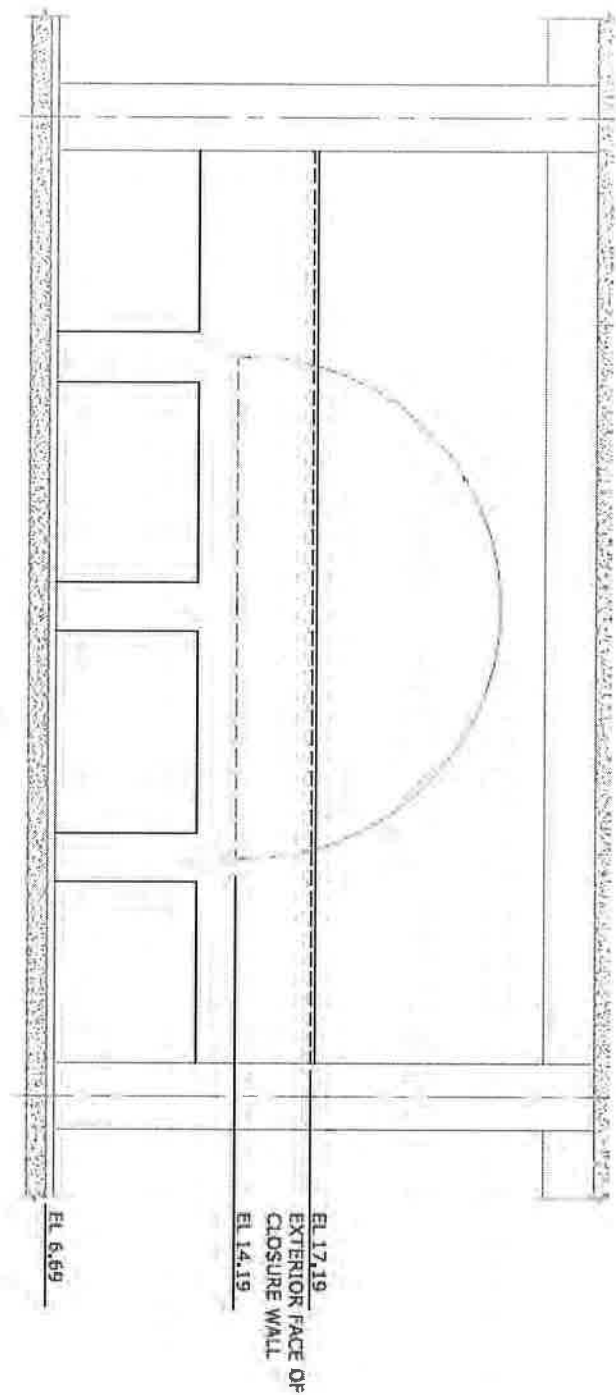


Flood Protection



- ❖ Most of the existing arches facing the Hudson River in the Red Zone are high enough to comply with this new design flood level.
- ❖ The arches that are on the East side of the structure or on the North side of the structure were built three feet lower than those facing the Hudson, but most of those are not in the Red Zone and therefore do not have to be raised.
- ❖ There are seven arches that must be raised three feet in order to protect the facility against the new design flood elevation.

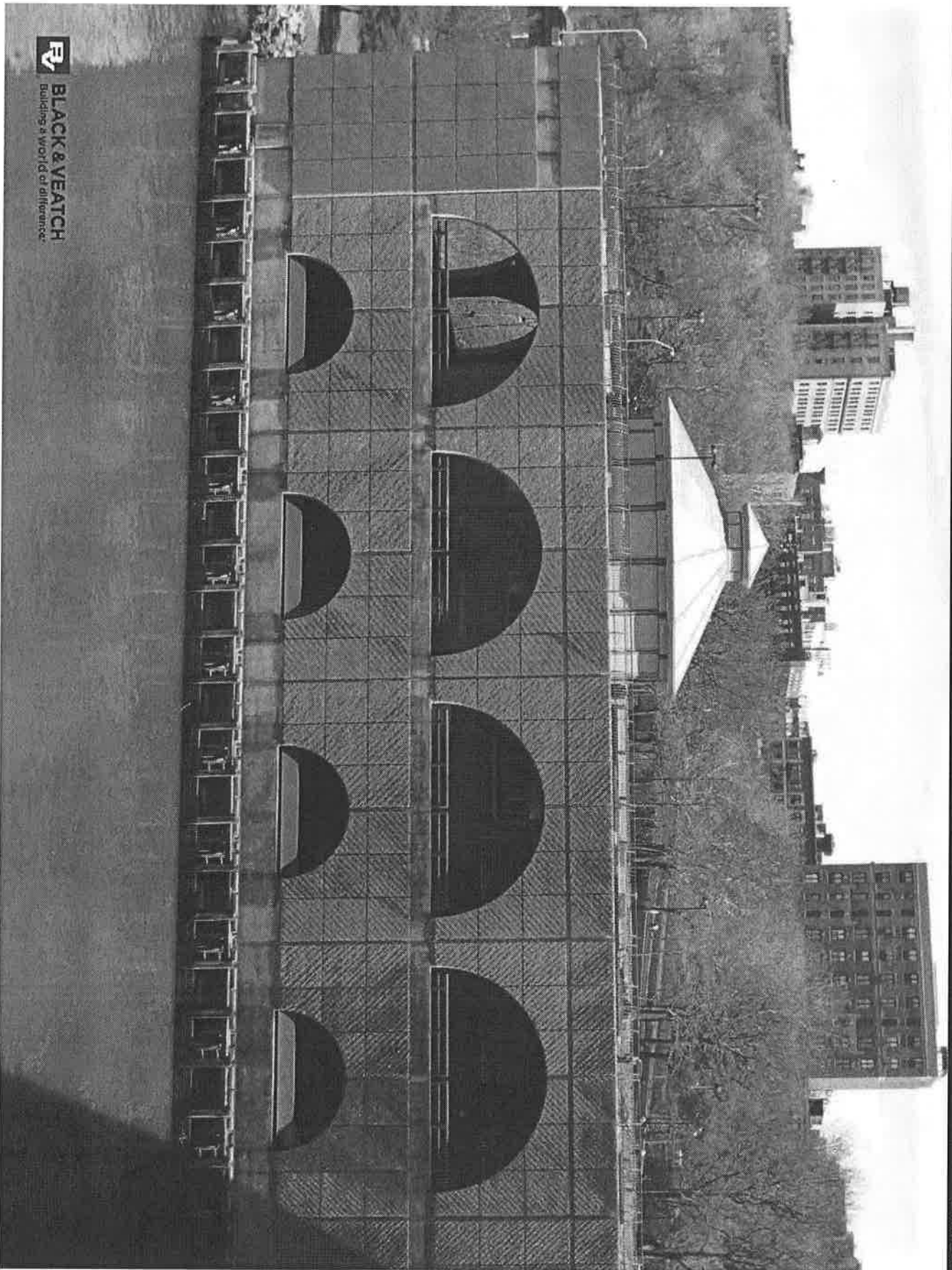


Flood Protection on North Side
