Agency Reports:

DOB Reported: The Buildings Department has several resources available to assist homeowners and tenants in buying, renting, building, maintaining and greening their homes.

Homeowners' Nights: The Department hosts weekly informational sessions for residents to meet with DOB Department representatives. Homeowners' Night is every Tuesday night from 4:00pm to 7:00pm at each borough office.

During the weekly Homeowners and Residents Night, individuals can obtain:

- Advice on home construction plans, including the permitting process;
- Information on how to check a contractor's license status;
- Guidance on reducing energy costs by weatherizing residences; Instructions on how to resolve Department-issued violations;
- Recommendations on steps to take before purchasing a home or signing a lease;
- Direction on how to secure or amend a property's Certificate of Occupancy;
- Permit guidelines for common home improvements, such as kitchen renovations and backyard shed installation; and
- Guidance on using the Buildings Information System (BIS) to search property history and permit information.

DEP Reported: All overdue water and sewer charges are considered as a lien against your property. Under new legislation passed January 22, 2015, the City has the authority to sell this lien to a third party, or lien holder, in a process called a lien sale. The following property types are eligible for the 2015 lien sale:

1. Tax Class 1 mixed use, two and three family homes with \$2,000 or more in water and sewer charges outstanding for a year or more
2. Tax Class 2 multi-family homes including condos with \$1,000 or more in water and sewer charges outstanding for a year or more
3. All commercial properties with \$1,000 or more in water and sewer charges outstanding for a year or more

When the City sells a lien, it is not selling the property. The new lien holder does not take title to the property. The lien holder purchases the right to collect the money that was previously owed to the City. Ultimately, however, if the property owner does not pay what is owed, the lien holder can begin formal foreclosure proceedings.

The 2015 lien sale process began on February 10, 2015 customers will have until May 14, 2015 to arrange for payment, and those who do not will have the lien on their property sold on May 15, 2015.

If you have received notice or feel your property may have a lien for non-payment the most important thing for you to do is contact the Department of Environmental Protection immediately by calling (718) 595-7000. You must arrange for payment, or, if you think that you do not owe the money, you must dispute the charges with DEP before May 5, 2015. If payment has not been arranged by May 14, 2015, and the charges are not in dispute, the lien on your property will be sold.

DEP is offering 19 paid summer internships at offices throughout the watershed, those accepted will have the chance to work alongside scientists, engineers, planners and other professionals who help run the largest unfiltered water supply in the United States.

The Internship Program is a great opportunity for college students to explore their field of study by working alongside world-class engineers and scientists who operate and protect New York City's water supply. The intern positions are available and include summer work associated with upstate water quality laboratories, water quality field operations, engineering, wastewater facilities, community water connections, wildlife biology, natural resources, storm water management, and science and research.

The internships are located at DEP's offices in Downsville, Hawthorne, Grahamsville, Kingston, Margaretville, Shokan and Valhalla.

The application deadline is April 1. Prospective interns are encouraged to carefully read the qualifications for each job to determine whether they meet the enrollment, GPA, coursework and other requirements.

Department of Buildings:

Reported - DOB is proposing to amend the rules regarding the classification of violations. DOB will hold a public hearing on the proposed rule, on Wednesday, March 25th, 2015, at 10a.m. The Hearing will be held in the 3rd floor conference room at 280 Broadway.

Office of Emergency Management (OEM): Plans and prepares for emergencies, educates the public about preparedness, coordinates response and recovery, and collects and disseminates emergency information.

OEM was established in 1996 as a mayoral office, OEM was granted departmental status in the New York City Charter in November 2001.

OEM prepares the City for Emergency Planning and preparedness activities from contingency planning and nurturing private sector partnerships to conducting drills and seeking funding for programs.

OEM Program(s):

- **Continuity of Operations Planning (COOP):**
OEM manages the City's COOP program, which ensures City Agencies can continue providing vital public services in the event of an emergency;
- **Contingency planning:** OEM oversees planning efforts for natural and man-made hazards;
- **Public-private initiatives:** OEM helps companies develop business continuity plans, conducts basic emergency management training, and fosters public-private communications;
- **Training and exercises:** OEM conducts citywide preparedness exercises to test plans and response techniques to identify areas of improvement;
- **Community Outreach:** Introduced in 2003, OEM community outreach programs include:
 - **Ready New York:** OEM's Ready New York preparedness campaign educates New Yorkers about the hazards they may face and encourages residents to prepare for emergencies.
 - **Community Emergency Response Teams (CERT):** CERT members are trained in basic response skills including fire safety, light search and rescue, disaster medical operations, and traffic control. CERT teams support their local communities by assisting with emergency education and response.
 - **NYC Citizen Corps Council:** Part of the national Citizen Corps program, New York City's council brings together local leaders from community organizations, government, the private sector, and volunteer programs to promote grassroots emergency preparedness and volunteerism.
 - **Social Media:** In 2009, OEM launched its Facebook page to help keep New Yorkers informed and prepared for emergencies. OEM social media presence has since grown to include Twitter (@NotifyNYC and @nycoem).

NYC Commission On Human Rights reported: The Hon. Carmelyn P. Malalis was recently appointed as Commissioner/Chair and the following mission of the NYC Commission on Human Rights were discussed: NYC Human Rights Law, prohibits discrimination in employment, housing, and public accommodations based on race, color, creed, age, national origin, alienage or citizenship status, gender (including gender identity and sexual harassment), sexual orientation, disability, marital status, and partnership status.

In addition, the Law affords protection against decimation in employment based on unemployment status, arrest or conviction record and status as a victim of domestic violence, stalking and sexual offenses.

It was also reported: **Commissioner Malalis attended the March For Gender Equality** In the spirit of underlining the Mayor's commitment to women's rights, Commissioner Malalis will joined the First Lady and other dignitaries, as New York City hosted an event in commemoration of International Women's Day and the 20th Anniversary of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action.

MBPO Reported:

- The New York City Charter mandates each Borough Presidents to submit a borough budget priorities report to the Mayor, City Council, and Director of Management. The Charter also mandates that a public notice is given to solicit input and recommendations from the public regarding the needs of the Borough. In order to prepare a report, Manhattan Borough President Gale Brewer is currently holding a virtual "town hall". - MBPO is hosting a SLA meeting; the meeting is a session for Community Boards to discuss liquor licensing, enforcement and response to community concerns. this meeting will touch base on the following topics:
 - Stipulation regime, especially community organizations considerations and stipulation standing.
 - Update on e-licensing, data mapping and access to historical information.
 - SLA licensee changes, such as asset sales, new ownership, hours and types of operations.
 - Procedures (notification, applicant questionnaire, stipulation language, hearing).

- Making stipulations accessible to NYPD and DEP enforcement via mobile devices.
- Possibility of local laws for stipulation posting and reduced evidence burden for community nuisances.
- Mechanisms to address non-criminal quality-of-life concerns that are outside NYPD and DEP jurisdiction.

Agency Updates:

DOE reported: Due to a positive response from parents across the city applying for Community and Citywide Education Council seats, they are extending the CEC application deadline to Monday, March 16, at 11:59 pm. This five-day extension gives parents who haven't applied a second chance to get involved in shaping education policy for New York City.

Over 900 parents have already applied for an Education Council seat –more than double the number of applications received in this same time frame in 2013. HUMAN RIGHTS LAW

The NYC Commission on Human Rights enforces the NYC Human Rights Law, which prohibits discrimination in employment, housing, and public accommodations based on race, color, creed, age, national origin, alienage or citizenship status, gender (including gender identity and sexual harassment), sexual orientation, disability, marital status, and partnership status.

In addition, the Law affords protection against discrimination in employment based on unemployment status, arrest or conviction record and status as a victim of domestic violence, stalking and sex offenses.

In housing, the Law affords additional protections based on lawful occupation, family status, and lawful source of income. The Law also prohibits retaliation, bias-related harassment, (including cyberbullying), bias-based profiling by law enforcement, and discrimination against interns.
