

## March, 2020 District Manager's Report

### Agency Reports:

**CENSUS 2020:** Towards the middle of this month you will receive an invitation to complete the 2020 Census, you should respond within a couple of days either online, by telephone or by mail. When completing your household form, count any children, including newborns who usually live and sleep at your home – even if they are not your own. If they split their time evenly between two households, count them if they will be living in your house hold on April 1, 2020.

Attached is a sample of the Census 2020 questionnaire that you will have to complete (pages for person 3,4,5, & 6 have been omitted to save space). The paper questionnaire only allows space for you to identify ten (10) members of your household. When answering Question #1, “How many people were living or staying in this house, apartment or mobile home on April 1, 2020?” If the answer is more than 10, then fill out information for 10 people. You will get a call later on from the Census Bureau to obtain information for the rest of the family. When completing the questionnaire online, you will be able to respond for more than 10 members in your household.

***Please be aware of scams. The Census will never ask you for your Social Security Number or Bank Account number.***

In 2010, New York was undercounted which resulted in less representation in Congress. This also meant that we did not receive our fair share of federal dollars to meet our needs. We cannot let that reoccur.

**Red Cross Reported: Volunteers carry out 90% of the humanitarian work of the Red Cross.** March is American Red Cross Month, a time when we recognize the humanitarian organization that eases people's suffering during life's emergencies in New York, across the United States and around the world. The Greater New York region of the American Red Cross has a long history of helping our neighbors in need by: delivering shelter, care and hope during disasters; making our community safer through its lifesaving Home Fire Campaign; providing lifesaving blood; teaching skills that save lives; and supporting military, veterans, and their families. During this Red Cross Month, we thank and honor the selfless volunteers, dedicated employees and generous supporters who make this compassionate work possible.

Throughout 2019, from South Ozone Park, Queens to Charleston, South Carolina to Thessaloniki, Greece, American Red Cross teams from across NYC, the Lower Hudson Valley and Long Island rushed to attend to intense human need. Ever at the ready, they quietly responded at a moment's notice, 24/7, to deliver relief and care to those suffering what is likely the worst moments of their lives. After **2,100** local fires, floods, building vacates, and other moments of tragedy, Greater NY Red Cross volunteers were there for neighbors coping with loss. They offered food, shelter, financial assistance, relief supplies, health assistance or simply a comforting presence to nearly **13,000** people suffering from tragedy.

**Mayor's Office Reported:** Over 20,000 New Yorkers have signed up for COVID, the City's text notification system. To get regular updates on the latest developments with coronavirus in

DCWP has declared facemasks, hand sanitizer and disinfectant wipes temporarily in short supply to prevent stores from overcharging New Yorkers. The declaration makes it temporarily illegal to drastically increase prices. Stores found to be overcharging consumers will be issued a violation with a fine up to \$500 per item. New Yorkers DCWP encourages consumers who feel they were overcharged to file a complaint at [nyc.gov/dcwp](http://nyc.gov/dcwp) or by contacting 311.

The Department of Health will expand translations of outreach materials into 7 additional languages to include Vietnamese, Hindi, Tagalog, Nepali, Punjabi, Hebrew, and Greek.

DOHMH is working alongside MOIA and NYCEM to ensure up to date guidance reach all New Yorkers in the languages that they speak. This expansion will allow outreach materials to reach over 93% of New Yorkers with Limited English Proficiency.

Given the high risk COVID-19 poses to seniors, a coordinated task force of representatives from DOHMH, DFTA, NYCHA, HPD, HDC, NYCEM, and PEU are having daily meetings regarding the City's elderly population. DFTA will immediately visit over 600 senior facilities to survey compliance with proper hygiene protocols and procedures. Additionally, DFTA staff will distribute literature and signage to DFTA Senior Centers with facts about COVID-19 and the proper precautionary measures to take.

New Yorkers should continue to exercise basic precautions while going about their lives: wash your hands, use alcohol-based hand sanitizer, and cover your nose and mouth when coughing or sneezing. Currently, 24 New York City residents are under mandatory quarantine and 2,019 are under voluntary home isolation. Those under mandatory quarantine receive daily calls and twice weekly unannounced visits by DOHMH. Upon identification, all individuals under voluntary home isolation will receive calls and texts with information and reminders to call a doctor or DOHMH if they feel sick or develop symptoms, such as fever and cough or shortness of breath.

**NY – Representative Adriano Espaillat (NY-13) Reported:** In collaboration with New York state and city elected officials, community advocates and health experts, a virtual townhall to address the local impact of the coronavirus throughout New York's 13<sup>th</sup> congressional district was held on Sunday, March 8<sup>th</sup>, 2020.

The event was livestreamed on Facebook (<https://www.facebook.com/RepEspaillat/>), on Twitter (<https://twitter.com/RepEspaillat>) and was carried live on MNN4 ([www.mnn.org](http://www.mnn.org)) public access channels MNN4, Spectrum 67 and 1998, Verizon FiOs 36 and RCN 85.

The physical location of this event was closed to the public due to efforts to prevent the spread of the coronavirus. The physical location is open only to media and affiliates in an effort to ensure full access of related information and public health awareness.

The Townhall was a huge success the MNN site had reached thousands of viewers, and it has been shared by dozens as well. The community is concerned and still looking for more answers. It has been decided to host virtual townhall meetings weekly. The next one will be held on Friday, March 13<sup>th</sup>, from 7pm to 8pm. MNN has been a great partner and agreed to host event again at El Barrio Firehouse, located 175 E 104th Street, New York, NY 10029.

Senator Jackson is hosting a virtual townhall on his own details to follow.

**WHDC Reported: Applications are now available for WHDC's 2020 ARISE! Youth Employment Program.** ARISE! will provide West Harlem youth (at least 14 years of age) with six (6) weeks of paid (\$15/hour) summer employment that will include both work responsibilities and academic enrichment. The program will include job readiness, NYS Regents/SAT/ACT preparation, mentorship, weekly trips, and participation in community service activities.

**DEP Reported: Rain Barrel Give Away Program** - Rain barrels connect directly to your property's gutter or downspout to capture and store the rainwater that falls on your rooftop. You can use the stored rainwater for outdoor chores, like gardening or washing your car. Using a rain barrel can save you money, as outdoor chores can account for up to 40 percent of an average household's water use during the summer. In New York City, rain barrels also help to reduce the amount of **Combined Sewer Overflows** that enter the City's sewer system, which protects the health of local waterways.

DEP has partnered with elected officials to organize rain barrel distribution events in select neighborhoods throughout the city. If you are interested in learning more about this program, contact your local elected official to ask if they have or are planning to schedule a rain barrel giveaway event.

Each homeowner who obtains a free rain barrel through this program receives an installation kit and instructions. Rain barrels should only be used for non-potable (non-drinking) purposes, such as gardening, and must be disconnected from the downspout during the winter months to avoid freezing.

**NYC Emergency Management Reported: Topic of the Month- John D. Solomon**

**Fellowship:** The [John D. Solomon Fellowship](#) for Public Service provides an opportunity for ten graduate students in the New York City area with the opportunity to complete a nine-month paid fellowship in an agency of New York City government or a nonprofit organization.

Fellows engage in a wide variety of activities, including representing their assigned agency at community and local government meetings, undertaking various individual and agency-directed projects, organizing and participating in community service projects, and working towards enhancing the preparedness and resilience of New York City.

The 2020-2021 academic year marks the ninth year of the fellowship program. In total, the program has welcomed 70 fellows into 14 different agencies and organizations. Over 50% of fellowship alumni have moved on to careers in New York City government. Many have also found exciting professions with nonprofit organizations, and in emergency management and public service-related fields around the world.

For those who recently traveled to China, Korea, or Italy and feel sick with fever, cough, or difficulty breathing, you should:

- Seek medical care right away. Before going to a doctor's office or emergency room, call ahead and tell them about recent travel and symptoms. Wear a face mask if you need to leave your home when sick.
- After you been seen by a health care provider, stay home and avoid contact with others until you are well.

- Avoid travel on any public transportation (such as bus, subway, train or airplane) until the illness resolves.
- Cover mouth and nose with a tissue or your sleeve (not hands) when coughing or sneezing.
- Wash hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer if soap and water are not available.

### **DID YOU KNOW?**

- **Alternate Side Parking penalties** were \$65 in Manhattan below 96<sup>th</sup> Street and \$45 elsewhere in New York City. Effective Thursday, February 20, 2020, the Alternate Side Parking fines became uniform across the entire city and is \$65.
- **Effective March 1, 2020, single use plastic carryout bags were banned**, with limited exceptions, in New York State. In New York City, businesses will begin collecting a five-

cent fee on paper carryout bags. This fee will not apply to any customers using SNAP (food stamps) or WIC. For more information or to get a free reusable bag, visit [nyc.gov/bags](http://nyc.gov/bags) or call 311.

- **Free Grants are available for owners of eligible buildings** to repair lead paint hazards and address other conditions that pose potential health risks. In average, eligible grants are \$8,000 to \$10,000 per unit!! Buildings are eligible if: They are constructed prior to 1960; They are occupied mostly by low and very-low income tenants; Some units have children under the age of six or pregnant women residing in them.

Peeling and cracking lead paint is the most commonly identified source of lead poisoning in young children, who can swallow lead paint dust and chips from window sills and floors. Under the City's Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Act, property owners must inspect and remediate all potential lead hazards safely – or face enforcement and penalties.

The Lead Hazard Reduction and Healthy Homes Program, a joint initiative of the Department of Housing Preservation and Development (HPD) and Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DOHMH) is intended to assist property owners correct such issues before incurring violations and enforcement action. The program is available in any of the five boroughs of New York City. - **Failure to Remove Canine Waste:** Each person who owns, or controls a dog must remove any feces left by that dog on any sidewalk, gutter, street, or other public area and dispose of it in a legal manner. The person may remove the feces and carry them away with him/her for disposal in a toilet or place them in a non-leaking container or bag and deposit them in a DSNY litter basket. The provisions of this law do not apply to a guide dog accompanying any blind person. **Fine: \$250**
- **Your Right to Vote in NYS** You lose your right to vote while you are in prison or on parole for a felony conviction. If you are convicted of a felony and your sentence is suspended, you can vote. If you are convicted of a felony and there was no prison sentence, you can vote. Your right to vote is automatically returned to you once you are out of state prison and off of parole. All you have to do is register, or re-register to vote.
- **Nonmedical exemptions to school vaccination requirements have ended for children attending day care and pre-K through 12<sup>th</sup> grade in New York State.** This includes all public, private, and religious schools. Religious exemptions are no longer allowed.

**Children with nonmedical exemptions must now be vaccinated to attend or remain in school.** Students who already have all required school vaccinations, and students with a valid medical exemption from a physician, are not affected by this change.

A medical exemption is allowed when a child has a medical condition that prevents them from receiving a vaccine.

- **TENANTS RIGHTS:** It is illegal for building owners to force tenants to leave their apartments or surrender their rights. If you are a tenant in an apartment, in the City of New York, who is being harassed by your landlord, you can get information and help.

**Harassment of tenants by landlords or owners can include:**

- Not offering leases or lease renewals, or repeatedly trying to pay you to move out;
- Unjustified eviction notices or illegal lockouts;
- Threats and intimidation, such as late-night phone calls;
- Overcharging for a rent-regulated apartment;
- Failure to provide necessary repairs or utilities;
- Deliberately causing construction-related problems for tenants, such as working after hours, blocking entrances, or failing to remove excessive dust or debris.

**Sidewalk Obstruction:** Sidewalk areas must be kept free from any obstruction that could impede pedestrian traffic. Obstructions may include, but are not limited to, refuse, refuse containers, merchandise, bins, racks, coin-operated rides, sandwich or A-frame signs, over-extended sidewalk displays/stands, ATMs, ice machines and acrylic enclosures, etc.

**Littering/Sweeping-Out/Throwing Out:** Littering, sweeping, throwing, or casting any material such as ashes, garbage, paper, dust or other garbage or rubbish into or upon any street or public place, vacant lot, air shaft, areaway, backyard, court or alley is illegal. Throwing garbage out of windows (for example, from buildings or vehicles) is also a violation. In addition, no person may allow anyone under his/her control (agency or employee) to commit a littering, sweep-out, or throw-out violation. Merchants must put all sweepings into suitable garbage receptacles for pickup by a private carter. Residential units must put sweepings into suitable garbage receptacles for pickup by private carter. Residential units must put sweepings into suitable garbage receptacles for pick-up by DSNY. Sanitation litter basket may not be used for this purpose. **NOTE:** When using a "blower", grass, leaves, litter, etc., must be blown into a pile and properly disposed of with other sweepings.

# NYC: STOP THE SPREAD OF CORONAVIRUS!

New Yorkers working together can slow the spread of Coronavirus (COVID-19) in New York City.



## PROTECT YOURSELF AND OTHERS

- Wash your hands with soap and water often.
- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue or sleeve when sneezing or coughing.
- Do not touch your face with unwashed hands.
- Do not shake hands. Instead wave or elbow bump.
- Monitor your health more closely than usual for cold or flu symptoms.

- If you have chronic conditions like lung disease, heart disease, diabetes, cancer or a weakened immune system, avoid unnecessary gatherings and events.
- If you have family or friends who have one of these conditions, do not visit them if you feel sick.



## STAY HOME IF SICK

- Stay home and call your doctor if you have symptoms like coughing, shortness of breath, fever, sore throat.
- If you do not feel better in 24-48 hours, seek care from your doctor.
- If you need help getting medical care, call 311.
- NYC will provide care regardless of immigration status or ability to pay.



## REDUCE OVERCROWDING

- Consider telecommuting.
- Stagger work hours, starting earlier or later.
- Walk or bike to work, if possible.
- If the train is too packed, wait for the next one.
