Borough Service Cabinet Highlights (4/28/17):

Smart Truck Management Plan – DOT reported: Trucks and commercial vehicles are essential to New York City, providing goods and services to millions of New Yorkers every day. The City's diverse mixture of land uses, dense urban environment and vast transportation infrastructure require a distinct set of rules and regulations to govern the operation of trucks and commercial vehicles. In order for this system to function efficiently, it is important that drivers observe the rules and regulations governing trucks and commercial vehicles

The New York City Department of Transportation is developing a plan to improve the quality of life for all New Yorkers through the safe, reliable, and environmentally responsible movement of goods. The citywide Smart Truck Management Plan will improve our understanding of truck route usage and compliance, movement of goods, needs of shoppers and receivers, and community concerns. With input from the community, the Department will then implement a series of strategies and actions to improve operations and enhance the economic vitality and quality of life for all New Yorkers. HRA Reported: ACCESS HRA is now providing an App to access your benefits on the go, view Case details and EBT balances. The Cases section of the app lets you view the current status of your case, the EBT balances for each of your benefits, and any upcoming Recertification dates.

View Appointments: the Appointment section of the app lets you view appointments that are upcoming, missed, or completed. It also lets you add a reminder for your appointment to your phone or tablet;

View Payments: The Payments section of the app lets you view upcoming and past payments for your case, such as payments made to your landlord, utility company, or to your EBT card;

Upload Documents: The Upload section of the app lets you up load and submit documents needed for your case to the Agency. It also shows a list of documents that you’ve already uploaded.

Department of Health and Mental Hygiene reported: The Health Department is warning New Yorkers about clay pots, cups and dishes (ceramic ware) containing extremely high levels of lead. Lead-glazed and lead-painted ceramics can release lead into food or drinks. In recent months, three adult New Yorkers became lead poisoned after using contaminated ceramic ware for preparing and serving foods and drinks. It was reported that their blood lead levels ranged

from 11 to 33 micrograms per deciliter (mcg/dL), whereas adult blood lead levels should be less than 5 micrograms per deciliter (mcg/dL).

Health Department investigators found ceramic ware containing lead at stores in Bushwick and Jackson Heights. Many of the ceramic ware was un-labeled or mislabeled. Some pottery contained stickers identifying Mexico as the country of origin; others had labels written in Spanish that specified the ceramic ware was for decorative purposes only. However, the decorative items were often sold alongside foods and produce, and shop owners told investigators that they were for culinary purposes. The Health Department purchased and tested some of the ceramic ware and found lead concentrations of up to 520,000 parts per million, which is extremely high and can have harmful effects on a person's health. Investigators are concerned contaminated ceramics may be for sale in other neighborhoods.

New Yorkers should immediately stop using traditional ceramic wares to prepare, store or serve food or drinks. Users should contact a physician to request a blood lead test; call **646-632-6023** or **212-POISONS (212-764-7667)** for additional information and to report locations where these products are being sold.

Zika Virus: The new citywide campaign "*Practice Safe Sex*" urges New Yorkers to remain vigilant as the Zika virus continues to circulate in the Caribbean, Mexico, Central America and parts of Miami-Dade County (Florida). New Yorkers can protect themselves from mosquito bites by wearing protective clothing and using mosquito repellent. It is also helpful to remove standing water, the breeding site for mosquitoes, such as bird baths, cans, flower pots, or any place where water can gather and mosquitoes can lay eggs. Manhattan District Attorney's Office Reported: Manhattan District Attorney Cyrus R. Vance, Jr., announced the investment of \$11.8million to enable victims of crime for underserved communities to access the services they need. The 10 organizations receiving funding serve victim communities who face significant barriers to accessing services, including: people of color; immigrants and non-native English speakers; LGBTQ individuals; and individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing. The Manhattan District Attorney's Office is providing these grants through its Criminal Justice Investment Initiative ("CJII"), which District Attorney Vance created using criminal forfeiture funds obtained through the Offices' settlements with international banks for violating U.S. sanctions.

Through these grants, the District Attorney's Office seeks to increase the utilization of these services within historically underserved communities, as well as mitigate the increased risk of criminal offending that can result from earlier victimization.

District Attorney Vance awarded the following three-year grants totaling \$11.8:

DID YOU KNOW?

- ✓ **Central A/C installation** is allowed in front of properties as long as they are covered;
- ✓ **Gas Fed Emergency Generators** require DOB permits prior to installation;
- ✓ **Yard Waste** generated by landscapers cannot be set out by landscapers for DSNY collection, nor can landscapers disperse such yard waste in or around the curb or street. Landscapers that generate yard waste are required by law to collect and dispose of any yard waste they generate at a permitted composting facility. However, if the DSNY Commissioner gives written notice that there is not sufficient capacity at permitted composting facilities within NYC; Landscapers may dispose of yard waste at any permitted solid waste facility.

Department of Consumer Affairs (DCA):

DCA is providing Licensed Stands: Fruit, vegetable, cigar, cigarette, tobacco, confectionery, ice cream, soft drink, flower, and shoe shine stands must be licensed by the Department of Consumer Affairs. Each licensed stand may extend no more than 4 feet from the store, but where the sidewalk is at 16 feet wide, the licensed stand may extend no more than 5 feet from the front store. Each stand may be no more than 10 feet long and 7 feet high, and must be a permanent structure (i.e. no folding tables or boxes set on crates).

Street Storage: When parking is not otherwise restricted, no person shall park any vehicle in any area, including a residential area, in excess of seven (7) consecutive days.

Call 811 before you dig: Ever wondered what the different colored markings on the ground mean? Wonder no more and keep information below for easy reference!!

The Uniform Color Code is used to indicate where utility lines are located before excavation. The white markings indicate actually where excavation will take place

White – Proposed Excavation;

Pink – Temporary Survey Markings;

Red – Electric Power Lines, Cables, Conduit & Lighting Cables;

Yellow – Gas, Oil, Steam, Petroleum & Gaseous Material;

Orange – Communications, Alarm, Signal Lines, Cables or Conduit;

Purple – Reclaimed Water, Imigation & Slurry Lines, Radioactive Material;

Green – Sewers & Drain Lines;
