**Community Affairs Bureau 2019 Youth Police Academy** - NYPD seeks to provide innovative and effective programs for the City's youth population. The Community Affairs Bureau's, Youth Police Academy, is such a program. It is designed to establish a positive relationship between the Police Department and the City's youth.

NYC residents, attending school between 10 and 15 years old are eligible to attend. The goals of the academy are:

- ✓ To enhance responsible citizenship;
- ✓ To provide positive interaction with police officers and to educate young people about the challenges and responsibility of police work;
- ✓ To encourage young people to take part in other youth programs offered by the Police Department such as: The Law Enforcement Explorers, Police Cadet Corps, and the Police Athletic League.

The 2019 Youth Police Academy is a six (6) week program that will hold sessions five (5) days a week. The academy will open at 8:30 a.m. and dismissal will be at 2p.m. Members will attend classroom sessions and lectures, role-plays and demonstrations by police officers in the areas of law, behavioral science, drug prevention, gang resistance, and life skills. Field trips are also part of the curriculum. Transportation to and from the field trips will be provided; the Academy will begin on Monday, July 1<sup>st</sup> and end on Friday, August 9<sup>th</sup>, 2019. **ALL APPLICATIONS ARE DUE BY FRIDAY, MAY 31<sup>ST</sup>, 2019.**

**Department of Sanitation Reported:** On the New Business Organics Rules Enforcement and stated as of February 15, 2019, the NYC Department of Sanitation will begin issuing summonses to the following businesses not separating their organic waste:

- Food service establishments with a floor area of at least 15,000 square feet
- Food service establishments that are part of a chain of 100 or more locations in NYC
- Retail food stores with a floor area of at least 25,000 square feet

**Since July 19, 2016, the following businesses have been required to separate organic waste:**

- Food service establishments in hotels with 150 or more rooms
- Arenas and stadiums with a seating capacity of at least 15,000 people
- Food manufacturers with a floor area of at least 25,000 square feet
- Food wholesalers with a floor area of at least 20,000 square feet

**MTA Reported:** New York City Transit will be performing necessary track work on the 1 line during the weekend of May 17-19. Work will be performed between 3:30 AM Saturday and 10:00 PM Sunday. During this weekend, **there will be no 1 train service between 137 St and Van Cortlandt Park/242 St. Free shuttle buses provide alternate service, making all 1 train stops.**

During the work there will be four shuttle bus routes making 1 station stops:

- 242 St to 215 St along Broadway, stopping at the 207 St A Station;
- 191 St to 168 St along St. Nicholas Av. Free transfer for M3 service;
- 168 St to 137 St along Broadway.

Dyckman St. 1 Stations to the Dyckman St. A station. *Late nights only.*

Use M100 days/evenings. To allow for safe track replacement work along the 1 train. There will be traffic pattern changes on Nagle Avenue between Dyckman St. and Academy St.

**NYC DEPARTMENT OF DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION (DDC) Reported: Community Advisory** – Reconstruction of Montefiore Park and Plaza (Broadway/Hamilton Place between W. 136<sup>th</sup> Street and W. 138<sup>th</sup> Street). Excavation Operation will begin on the eastside of Broadway from 138<sup>th</sup> to 139<sup>th</sup> street beginning Monday, May 20, 2019. ### **DEP Reported:**

The New York City Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) recently proposed a 2.31 percent increase in Fiscal Year 2020 (FY20) water rate to the New York City Water Board. The proposed rate would keep the cost of water in New York City well below the national average. Since Mayor de Blasio made the commitment to shrink, then eliminate, the rental payment from the water system, \$792 million of ratepayer funds have stayed in the system, helping to fund critical programs while keeping rates low for property owners and businesses. The proposed rate increase is subject to review and approval by the Water Board.

The proposal also maintains existing affordability programs for low-income homeowners and multi-family housing properties that are expected to benefit as many as 60,000 customers and 40,000 units, respectively. In addition, the proposal recommends freezing the minimum charge at \$1.27 per day for the sixth consecutive year for those customers who use fewer than 92 gallons per day.

**What the Proposed Rate Would Mean for an Average Customer** - If the 2.31% water rate increase is adopted by the Board:

- A typical single-family homeowner will see an increase from \$945/year to \$967/year for water and sewer bills—an increase of \$1.82/month (based on an average consumption of 70,000 gallons of water per year).
- A typical multi-family unit with metered billing will see an increase from \$702/year/unit to \$718/year/unit—an increase of \$1.35/month (based on an average consumption of 52,000 gallons of water per year).

**DOT Reported:**

- Resurfacing season has started please report any areas within the district to DOT;
- Discussions will continue with MCB9 regarding the implementation of bike lanes on Amsterdam Ave. (bet. 110<sup>th</sup> – 155<sup>th</sup> Streets);

**DOT will be implementing new crossings at the following locations:**

- Install enhanced crossings a Claremont Ave. and LaSalle St. including high visibility crosswalks and yield-to-pedestrian signage;
- Add a painted curb extension at Claremont Ave. and La Salle St.;
- Add stop signs on Claremont Ave. at W. 119<sup>th</sup> Str. With new high visibility crosswalks;
- Install 30ft of daylighting on both Claremont Ave. approaches to W. 119<sup>th</sup> St.;
- Move truck loading zone 30ft south on Claremont Ave.

**Hamilton Place Plaza Proposal has been submitted to MCB9** to expand Public Space; improve pedestrian circulation; Enhance safety; Shorten pedestrian crossings.

**Mayor's Office Reported:** On a fire that began in the kitchen of a fifth-floor Harlem apartment that killed a family of two adults and four children. On Wednesday, Police responded to a 911 call of a fire at about 1:40 a.m. early Wednesday morning at the Frederick Samuel Houses in Harlem on Adam Clayton Powell Jr. Boulevard. After firefighters put out the blaze, responding officers found six people unconscious and unresponsive in the rear bedrooms, police said. Emergency responders pronounced six people dead at the scene, including a 45-year-old woman and a 33-year-old man. Two girls ages 11 and 6 and two boys ages 8 and 3 were also dead.

Three others suffered minor smoke inhalation and were taken to area hospitals, said Brian Fitzgerald, spokesperson for FDNY. Not all of the tenants were displaced, and the Red Cross was called to the scene.

Fire Commissioner Daniel Nigro said that when firefighters arrived the fire stretched out the windows on two sides of the building. The bodies were found in two bedrooms in the six-room apartment.

The fire began in the kitchen and eventually spread to every room in the apartment, Nigro stated the kitchen is the closest room to the front door, and the fire escapes were on the opposite end of the apartment from the rear bedroom, so the family was not able to get to an escape, Nigro said.

New York City Housing Authority interim chair and CEO Kathryn Garcia said the housing complex had 62 units and 129 families. The smoke alarm and carbon monoxide detector in this apartment was most recently tested in January.

**Special Restrictions on Parking:** Parking for certain purposes prohibited no person regularly engaged in the repair of vehicles shall park a vehicle upon any roadway or off-street parking facility for the principal purpose of washing, greasing, or repairing such vehicle, except repairs necessitated by an emergency. *This Rule is Enforced by the NYPD*

**TENANTS RIGHTS:** It is illegal for building owners to force tenants to leave their apartments or surrender their rights. If you are a tenant in an apartment in the City who is being harassed by your landlord, you can get information and help.

**Harassment of tenants by landlords or owners can include:**

- Not offering leases or lease renewals, or repeatedly trying to pay you to move out;
- Unjustified eviction notices or illegal lockouts;
- Threats and intimidation, such as late-night phone calls;
- Overcharging for a rent-regulated apartment;
- Failure to provide necessary repairs or utilities;
- Deliberately causing construction-related problems for tenants, such as working after hours, blocking entrances, or failing to remove excessive dust or debris.


**Sidewalk Obstruction:** Sidewalk areas must be kept free from any obstruction that could impede pedestrian traffic. Obstructions may include, but are not limited to, refuse, refuse containers, merchandise, bins, racks, coin-operated rides, sandwich or A-frame signs, over-extended sidewalk displays/stands, ATMs, ice machines and acrylic enclosures, etc.

**Failure to Remove Canine Waste:** Each person who owns, or controls a dog must remove any feces left by that dog on any sidewalk, gutter, street, or other public area and dispose of it in a legal manner. The person may remove the feces and carry them away with him/her for disposal

in a toilet or place them in a non-leaking container or bag and deposit them in a DSNY litter basket. The provisions of this law do not apply to a guide dog accompanying any blind person.

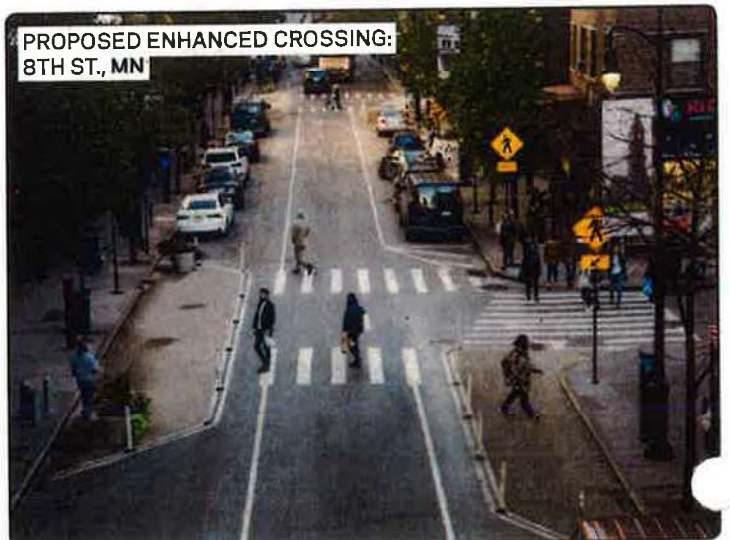

CLAREMONT AVE. & La SALLE ST.

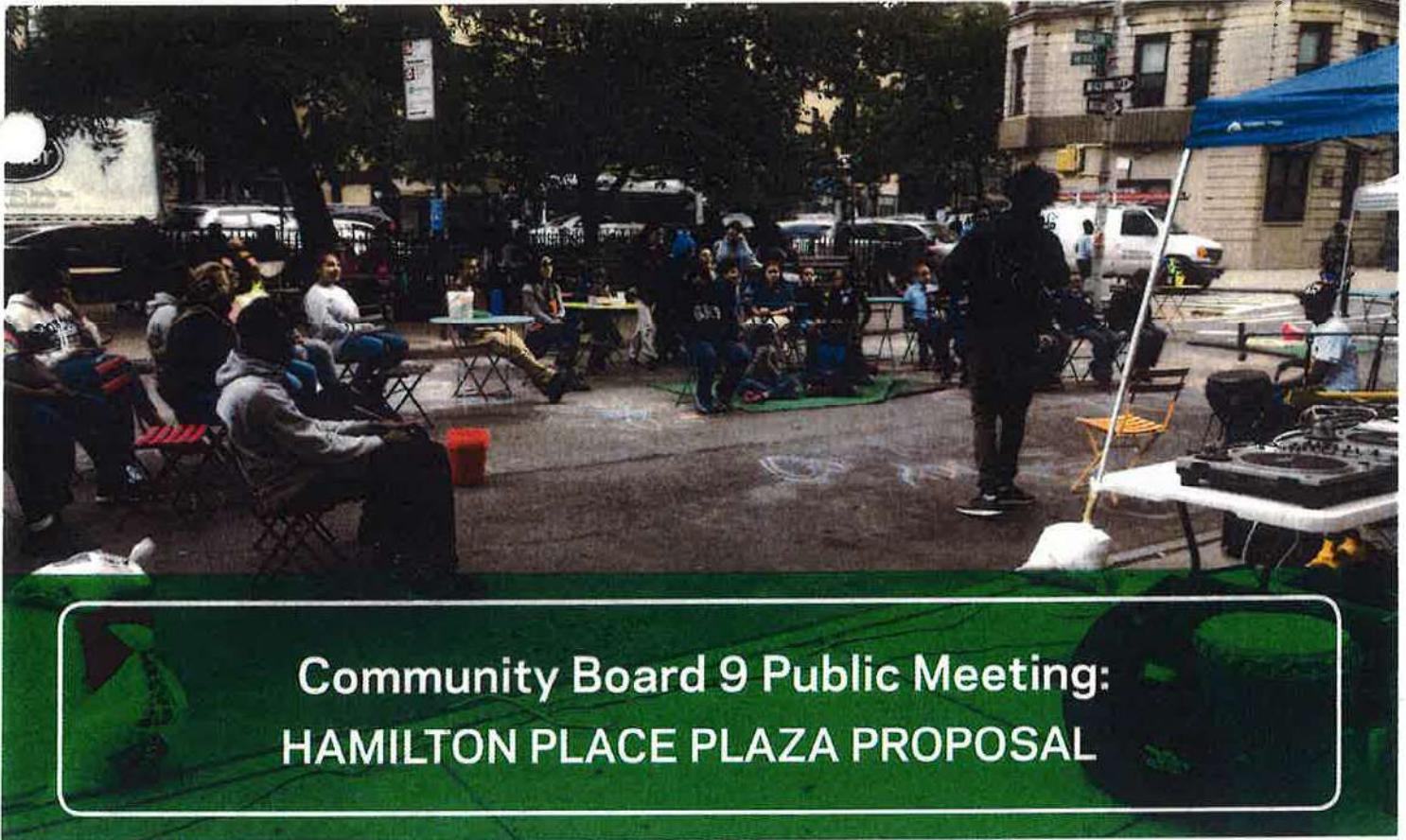


PROPOSED ENHANCED CROSSING:
