DEP Reported: New York City Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) collects and treats an average of 1.3 billion gallons of wastewater per day at its 14 wastewater treatment plants, and our Bureau of Wastewater Treatment is responsible for the operation and maintenance of all facilities related to the treatment of sewage, including wastewater treatment plants (WWTPs), collections facilities, wastewater laboratories, harbor vessels and sludge dewatering facilities.

Appointment of New Schools Chancellor

Mayor Bill de Blasio appointed Richard A. Carranza as New York City's next Schools Chancellor. As Superintendent of the Houston Independent School District, Carranza led the effort to re-open schools after Hurricane Harvey. Carranza also previously served as the Superintendent of the San Francisco Unified School District, where he raised graduation rates to historic highs. With a strong commitment to equity and excellence, Carranza has a proven record of narrowing the achievement gap and turning around struggling schools in these diverse districts.

In Houston, Carranza was widely praised for leading the successful effort to re-open schools two-weeks after Hurricane Harvey. This included coordinating transportation for students living in shelter and providing counseling for all students and staff. During his eight years as Deputy Superintendent and then Superintendent in San Francisco, Carranza drove remarkable progress in academic outcomes, outpacing gains in the state and narrowing the achievement gap. He raised graduation rates for African-American students by 13.9 percentage points, and for Hispanic students by 15.4 percentage points, significantly faster than the overall growth rates in California as a whole.

About Richard A. Carranza

Richard A. Carranza has served as Superintendent of the Houston Independent School District since August 2016. HISD is the largest school district in Texas and the seventh largest district in the United States, with a predominately Hispanic and Black student population.

Prior to Houston, Carranza worked for the San Francisco Unified School District, first as Deputy Superintendent for Instruction, Innovation and Social Justice then Superintendent. Before moving to San Francisco, he served as Northwest Region superintendent for the Clark County

School District in Las Vegas, where he oversaw 66 schools with more than 66,000 students. He began his career as a high school, bilingual social studies and music teacher, then a principal in Tucson.

Carranza is the past chairman of the Board of Directors for the Council of the Great City Schools, where he served as a national spokesperson on significant issues facing urban school districts. He also served on the Board of Directors of the Association of Latino Administrators and Superintendents, the National Commission on Teaching and America's Future, the American Association of School Administrators Executive Committee, and the K to College Advisory Board.

Education Week profiled Carranza as a national 2015 Leader to Learn From. He earned a bachelor of arts in secondary education from the University of Arizona and a master of education with distinction in educational leadership from Northern Arizona University. He has completed his doctoral coursework through Northern Arizona University and is currently pursuing a doctorate of education through Nova Southeastern University in Educational leadership.

Carranza is a fluent Spanish-speaker and accomplished mariachi musician. He is married to Monique and has two daughters.

- Students in Temporary Housing can apply to pre-K even if their housing situation is uncertain. They do not need paperwork to apply to schools, accept an offer, or enroll in a school.

City Council Member Mark Levine Reported: The 7th Councilmanic District is hosting its Participatory Budget (4th Cycle) which started Saturday, April 7th thru Sunday, April 15th.

This year's projects include:

Modernizing Neighborhood Libraries:

\$200,000 for new computers, printers, wi-fi, projectors, and audio systems in 7th District public libraries;

Upgrading Community Parks:

\$570,000 to rebuild the handball court at the Alexander Hamilton Playground;

\$450,000 to repair the Morningside Park playground at 110th Street, including new equipment for children of all ages;

\$500,000 for new playground turf at PS 125;

Investing in our Schools:

\$200,000 for technology upgrades at MS 54, the Booker T. Washington Middle School (103 West 107th St)

\$200,000 for technology upgrades at PS 36 Margaret Douglas School (123 Morningside Drive);

\$450,000 for upgrade the gym at PS 165, the Roberts E. Simon School (234 West 109th St);

Building Stronger NYCHA Communities:

\$500,000 to upgrade the playground and basketball courts at Frederick Douglass Houses;

\$500,000 for external lighting at Grant Houses; \$200,000 for an emergency readiness kiosk at Manhattanville Houses;

Improving Commutes:

\$60,000 for Bus Countdown Clocks along Broadway

- Use a pen with pigmented (permanent) ink to write checks (this ink is not easy to alter);
- Shred any voided or incorrectly written checks;
- Check your account balance frequently to ensure checks were cleared by the establishment they were written to.


